CLINICAL CORNER – Mood and Anxiety Disorders.

The mood disorders include those where the primary symptom is a disturbance in mood, where there may be inappropriate, exaggerated, or a limited range of feelings or emotions. Everyone feels “down” sometimes, and everybody experiences feelings of excitement or emotional pleasure. However, when a patient has a mood disorder, these feelings or emotions are experienced to the extreme, over a period of time, and cause some level of impairment in functioning as a result of the symptoms. As with mood disorders, anxiety is something that everyone feels now and then, but anxiety disorders

exist when anxiety symptoms reach the point of frequency and intensity that they cause significant impairment.

Some advice regarding mood and anxiety disorders:

- Differentiate between mood disorders, commonplace expressions of depression, and depression associated with more serious mental illness.
- Conduct careful and continuous assessment since mood symptoms may be the result of substance abuse and not an underlying mental disorder
