The here and now technique of immediacy utilized in Modern Group offers trainees a different avenue to understand themselves and develop the emotional resilience need to work effectively with their clients. In Modern Group, the leader is not the only source of emotional nourishment or wisdom, however. Using the technique of bridging,the leader creates bonds between members, multiplying the effect of interventions used by the group leader and ultimately making the group itself an agent of change. These dual agents of change offer group members the opportunity to engage and explore their relationships not only with the group leader but also group members, opening avenues to study sibling dynamics as well as issues around power and privilege.

## **Course Objectives:**

- Develop additional avenues to observe and experience emotions evoked by the therapeutic process.
