Course Description:

Supervising clinicians is different than providing direct patient care. This course will provide clinicians and supervisors with the opportunity to explore the myriad of issues that can arise in the supervisory space. Some of the topics will include supervision in psychoanalytic institutes. Issues related to both individual and group supervision will be explored. The ethical responsibilities of the supervisor will be examined. The role of the unconscious in the work with the patient, the analyst, and the supervisor will be investigated. Students will have an opportunity to participate in discussions about the assigned readings and lectures. There will also be opportunities to discuss case material within the framework of the supervisory experience.

Objectives:

1. Participants will be able to demonstrate how to organize a framework around which effective supervision can occur.
2. Participants will be able to demonstrate knowledge of the basic principles of psychoanalytic supervision.
3. Participants will be able to demonstrate the role of the unconscious in understanding the process of psychoanalytic supervision.
