Course Description:

This workshop will explore the “social dream” as we as a country struggle with the dual traumas of the COVID-19 pandemic and the systemic racism that the Black lives movement is seeking to address. We will revisit the theory of dream formation using *The Third Reich of Dreams: The Nightmares of a Nation* by Charolotte Beradt (1966) to deepen our understanding of how our social and political lives impact our unconscious and how dreams reveal this. We will explore historical antecedents of our current political situation with a focus on clinical implications.

Course Objectives:

After completing this course students will be able to:

1. Differentiate between “social dreams” and wish-fulfilment dreams
2. Be better at listening for what is unspeakable being put into dream imagery
3. Acknowledge the universality of the nightmares themes and explore the signs and symptoms of people disturbed by dreaming “social dreams”

Course Requirements

- Come prepared, having read the readings
- Participate actively in discussions
- Bring in dreams of family, friends, or patients (disguise clinical material) for class discussion
